SHSBC TRAINING LINE UP

The following highly successful actions of the original SHSBC are reintroduced, as these were the actions instituted by Ron, which made the original "Saint Hiller" famous for his "presence".

The original SHSBC taught the auditor "presence" the way the Class VIII Course today teaches "standardness".

"Presence", is a very vital quality in an auditor and a true "Saint Hiller" can be recognised by this fact alone.

1. All preSHSBC classifications are suspended while the student is on SHSBC O-IV.
2. Auditing requirements on the SHSBC are now done on Level V.
3. Auditing requirements for levels O to IV when taken on the SHSBC are dropped.
4. Students on levels O to IV are required to study and drill, study and drill.
5. At level V of the SHSBC the student co-audits with his fellow Vs and also audits lower level students on the level they are currently studying on.
6. The Class V audits O and earns his O Full Classification confirmation, then Class I, then Class II etc.
7. The D of T can help with the Case Supervision of folders but in a large class a special qualified C/S is assigned to student folder O/Sing.
8. Additionally the level V student is required to study all books and material reading through all HCOBs from the beginning up to PT (excepting only confidential issues) in chronological order.
9. At Level V the student also audits on closed circuit TV demonstrations which are watched by the lower level students and the rest of the course.
10. Two TV Cameras, (16 mm wide angle lens) are used for these demonstrations with two 24" TV sets in each area the demonstration is being viewed from.
11. One TV camera is focused on the meter to show a large meter dial on one of the TV sets.

12. The other camera is focused on the session.
13. Both screens are watched together by the other students who are all compelled to attend the demonstrations.
14. A standby experienced auditor is always available to reassure the pc during a TV demo session.
15. The watching students note the strong and weak points of the demonstration and whether the auditor passes it or not. Whether he has auditing presence and any goofs made.
16. There is also a soundproof auditing room fitted out with a tape recorder where students on level V are required to tape their sessions and listen to them afterwards to note outnesses and correct them. Students also correct each others tapes.
17. Flag Auditor tapes of auditing sessions of various levels are available and are listened to by the Class V students so they can compare them with their own session. This gives them the true scene and holds a standard.
18. Another strict requirement is that if a student is sent to cramming then his twin is sent too. If his twin was coaching correctly and handling misunderstands the student wouldn't need to have gone to cramming. They are both returned back to class together.
19. However students must be matched correctly as to speed etc. and Supervisors can use test graphs to establish this.
20. Twins are paired males together, females together where possible.

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The above points are what made the original SHSEC so successful and are what gave the Saint Hiller his presence.

These points get the student to get and keep his own ethics in and put in ethics on his fellow students and thus the course almost runs itself.

After graduating Class V with satisfactory auditing on all lower levels the student does Level VI and then internes for the SH Org and audits till flubless as a Class VI auditor at which time his full Class VI Certificate is awarded.

Checksheets must include these actions or you'll never make a Saint Hiller.

NOTE:

The use of "electronic learning aids" such as TV and taped sessions played an important part in the early SHSEC.

The use of these dropped out sometime after Ron left Saint Hill.

The reason or "Why" for this was that others didn't fully know or understand what the electronics learning aid was for or why it was used.

Thus there was an omitted scene and electronic aides dropped out of use.

These devices make it possible for an ideal scene to be presented for comparison, such as by hearing tapes of sessions given by Flag Auditors.

They also enable an auditor to listen to his own sessions and from an exterior viewpoint spot and correct outnesses that he is not aware of in session. Auditors otherwise have no comparison with their own auditing. Sitting with a pc in a room does not permit an auditor to see and correct errors. Thus HIS AUDITING SKILL REMAINS POOR FOR LACK OF COMPARISON WITH OTHER TAPES AND REVIEW OF HIS OWN.

TV demonstrations enable various approaches towards the ideal scene to be viewed and learned from.

Additionally the use of these devices by the group help the individual keep his own and his fellows ethics in. An auditor can't get away with just PR about how good he is, he is asked to show it.

The group participation in watching TV sessions and each student grading the demonstrators, made Saint Hillers into a group responsible for their own quality and made a Saint Hiller BE a Saint Hiller and a part of that group.

All of these electronic methods greatly increase reality and therefore understanding of the subject. An ideal scene can then be closely approached and attained. So real auditors are made - "Saint Hillers".
